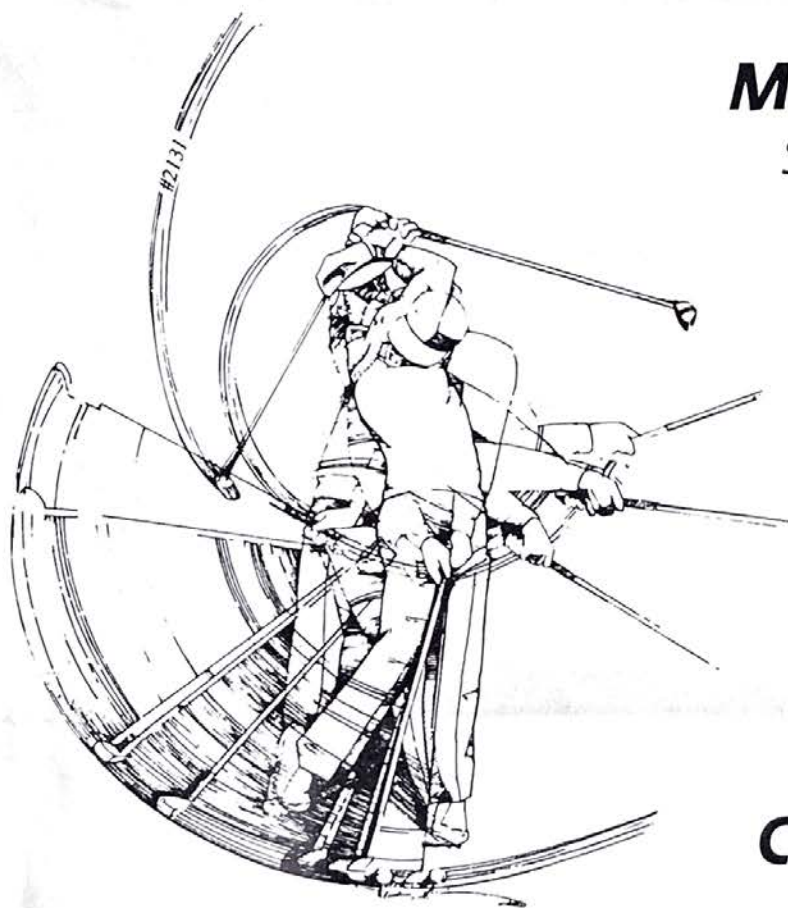

From the Greens Committee

The Greens Committee wishes to enlist the co-operation and assistance of all members to maintain the condition and appearance of our golf course.

Of prime importance is the necessity of keeping power carts on the cart path at all times. Since cart paths are a *one way street*, there is no necessity to pull off to the side to park as is often done.

As much as possible, pull carts should also be kept on the cart paths and always well away from the aprons of the greens, although the turf in most areas tolerates foot and pull cart traffic well, some areas are prone to become worn down and damaged.

There are several specific areas worth mentioning in regard to power carts. Please keep well away from the third green and in particular avoid driving between the pond and the green. Please stay on the cart path to the left of the 6th green and to the right of the 7th tee. Likewise keep well to the right of the 8th green and to the left of the 9th green. Please avoid taking the carts into the woods. The few extra yards of walking and extra seconds taken will go a long way to preserving the condition of the course.

The idea of using directional signs on the golf course has been considered, but is impractical because of the necessity for the crew to remove and replace the signs when mowing.

We remind you also of your responsibilities to replace divots and to repair ball marks. The seed boxes will soon be in use and we ask you to fill in and repair your divot marks in the tees with the contents.

We would ask that you remind any transgressors of their errors, and we ensure you that you have the full support of the greens committee. Your own good example will go a long way towards setting proper standards for others to follow. Please remember that it is your course and we are grateful for your co-operation.

From the Superintendent

The last week of May we will aerate and topdress all our greens. Since these maintenance practices disrupt play it may be beneficial to explain why we carry out these operations.

Aerating or coring is a form of cultivation involving the use of a hollow tine or spoon to remove soil cores that leaves a hole or cavity in the sod. Aerating is done to relieve soil compaction and to reduce the accumulation of thatch.

Compaction alters the soil's physical properties that affect turf-grass growth and development. Compaction results in the destruction of soil structure leaving small pore spaces which reduce water infiltration and percolation rates and increases surface runoff. The decrease in pore space reduces the air component of the soil.

Oxygen is required by the turfgrass roots for respiration and the maintenance of life processes. Oxygen is also required for the uptake of certain essential elements by turfgrass roots. Roots not only absorb oxygen but release carbon dioxide during respiration. An accumulation of carbon dioxide or other gases may result in gases becoming toxic to the roots. Aerating or coring opens the soil allowing water and air to infiltrate the soil.

Thatch is a layer of dead and living stems and roots that develop between the zone of green vegetation and the soil surface. Problems associated with excessive accumulations include (a) increased disease and insect problems; (b) localized dry spots; (c) chlorosis; (d) proneness to scalping; (e) foot printing; and (f) decreased heat, cold and drought hardiness.

Aerating and topdressing form an intermixed layer of organic matter and soil which is termed mat. The intermixing of topdressing and organic matter greatly increase the rate at which the organic matter decomposes thus reducing thatch. Removal of the cores after aerating reduce thatch accumulations as the cores contain a portion of the thatch layer.

I hope that this article has given you some of the theory behind why we carry out the aerating and top-dressing practices. These operations, if not done would result in increased problem and a corresponding decline in the quality of our greens.

Dress Code

1. All members and green fee players must be dressed in a manner that will uphold the dignity of the Club at all times.
2. Shirts must be worn at all times.
3. Only tailored shorts will be allowed on the course. Cut-offs, athletic type shorts, etc., will not be permitted.
4. Ladies are not permitted to wear midriff or bra-type tops
5. Only Golf shoes or running shoes are allowed on the course; no boots or high heeled shoes will be permitted.
6. Children under the age of 16 are not permitted on the course, unless he or she is a registered junior member of the Club, or accompanied by an adult 19 years of age or older, or a participant in a Club sanctioned event. Children under the age of 6 are not permitted on the course at any time, nor are non-participating juniors under 16 (Authorized caddies shall be the exception to the rule).

Tournament Format

1.
