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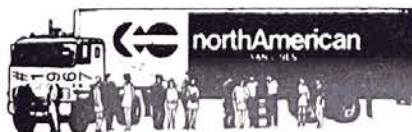
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Men's Night

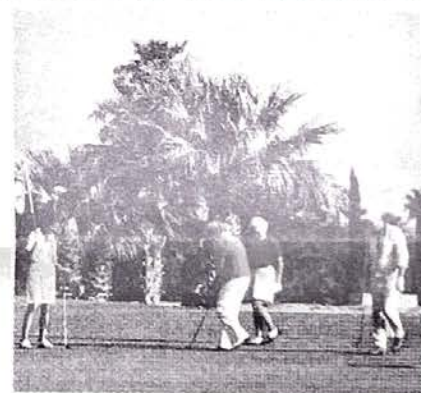

On behalf of the Ice Crew and myself I would like to welcome all the Curlers to the 1989-90 Curling Season. Our Ice Crew for this season is unchanged with Wes Petkau (Assistant Ice Maker), Dean Ward, John Wercholak and Ray Wercholak. These people are responsible for our day to day ice maintenance. If you have any questions or concerns please feel free to approach them or myself.

I would like to bring to your attention two changes on the ice surface. Under new CCA Rules, hog lines are now a solid 4" ribbon. a rock must be completely over the line to remain in play. A rock must also be released before reaching the line.

The back line is now placed with the outer edge 6'2" from the centre of the tee line. A stone coming to rest beyond the back line shall be removed from play.

We trust everyone had an enjoyable summer and on behalf of my staff we wish everyone a successful and enjoyable curling season.

Notes to 1989-90 Curling Rates

Intermediate Curling Rate: **\$100.00** (CM or NM) any evening League.

"Intermediate": A person who is nineteen years of age and has not reached the age of twenty-four (both prior to August 31, 1989) and is still in full attendance at a post-secondary educational institution.

Junior Evening Rate: **\$75.00** (CM or NM)

Juniors and Intermediates Curling in evening leagues is on a space available basis.

Proposed Thursday Evening Ladies Super League - minimum of 8 teams required.

Rate: **\$137.00** (CM) **\$183.00** (NM)

Proposed Thursday Afternoon Senior League - minimum 8 teams required.

Rate: **\$ 75.00** (CM) **\$ 85.00** (NM)

If curling in any other Senior League, rate will be \$50.00 (CM or NM) for this League only.

HOUSE RULES for all "House" Leagues

Revised 1988

1. PAID spare curlers may play any position, providing they are replacing the missing curler from that rink, or a lower position.
2. A curler who curls in any one of the house leagues in our Club can spare at any time (social spare), but MUST play LEAD.
3. (a) Ladies may not spare in Men's leagues.
(b) Men may not spare in Ladies' leagues.
4. No person is allowed on the ice with street shoes or boots.
5. In Club curling, when curling with three players, Lead and Second must throw THREE rocks each.
6. In Mixed curling, Ladies and Men MUST play alternate positions. Man or Lady may skip (in the event that you play with three players only, you can curl your regular positions).
7. (a) Men's and Ladies' Leagues - All games will be eight (8) ends.
(b) Mixed Leagues - All games will be eight (8) ends in length.
(All early draws will be played with a bell during regular league play.)
8. Ensure that the ice is cleaned after EVERY draw. WINNERS are responsible for cleaning the ice.

Any violation of these rules could result in a game forfeit. If you are aware of a violation prior to commencement of play, same should be resolved at that time. However, a written protest can be made within one week of the alleged violation (i.e., protest must be made prior to the same draw in the following week) to the Curling Committee.

Note: C.C.A. or C.L.C.A. Rules apply to all BONSPIELS and PLAYDOWNS.

BELL RULE

When the bell rings you finish the end you are on plus one more. However, an end does not begin until the first rock of an end has been delivered.

PLEASE KEEP THE ICE SURFACE CLEAN

1. No street shoes allowed on ice surface.
2. WINNERS will clean ice.
3. Ensure ice is cleaned after EVERY draw.
4. Pull rocks out from the boards, remove foam bumpers, sweeping out ends and corners. Rocks are NOT to be removed from ice surface.
5. Clean areas along sides of sheets prior to using mop.
6. Mop to be used over entire ice surface.
7. Take down score - ready for next draw.

BELLS - Please ensure that bells are rung when necessary at the proper times, which are posted.

A little time, effort and co-operation will help keep our ice clean.

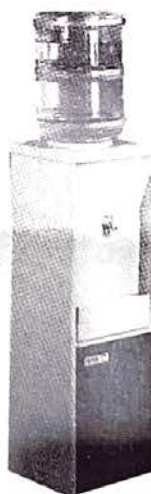

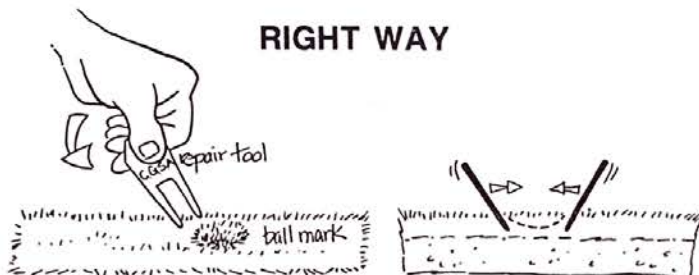
The following article was taken from the July/August edition of *Greenmaster*, the official magazine of the Canadian Golf Superintendents Association.

Golfers, help heal those greens: Know how to repair ball marks

We all know the importance of repairing ball pitch-marks on the green for putting consistency, but how many golfers know the proper way to perform this simple task?

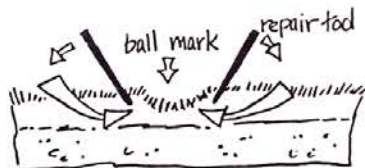
There is a right way and a wrong way, and I would like to thank Frank Dobie of the Sharon (Ohio) Golf Club for sharing his very effective method of illustrating the proper technique for ball-mark repairs:

RIGHT WAY



1. Discard loose piece of turf taken out by the ball.
2. Insert repair tool just outside the back of the ball mark. Pull the turf toward the centre of the hole. Repeat this same motion on all sides of the hole.
3. Gently tap the repaired area with your putter.
4. This action stretches undamaged turf over the ball mark, providing instant recover.

WRONG WAY



1. DO NOT replace the loose piece of turf taken out by the ball. It will only die and delay the healing process.
2. DO NOT pry up the centre of the depression with the repair tool as it exposes the soil and will delay the healing process.
3. DO NOT insert repair tool and twist it. This only breaks more turf loose.

Assessment Options

REGULAR MEMBERSHIPS

As a Club Member, you have the following options:

- Plan #1 \$20.00 per month Club Charge (which can be used in the Food and Beverage Area) as described above.
- Plan #2 \$85.00 Annual Assessment (this is an assessment only, you receive no return).
- Plan #3 \$35.00 Annual Assessment (applicable to Club Members who reside outside of a 50 mile radius of Prince George only).
- Plan #4 \$25.00 Annual Assessment (applicable to Club Members who for health reasons can't avail themselves of the Clubhouse Facilities).
- Plan #6 \$40.00 per month Club Charge for 6 months, April 1st to September 30th.
- Plan #6B As above - October 1st to March 30th.
- Plan #7B The option of paying \$240.00 to the club on one occasion and working off a credit on your account.
- Plan #7C The option of annual adjustment that requires that you charge \$240.00 per year at any time throughout the year. The difference between \$240.00 and what you've charged over the year will become your assessment.
- Plan #8 Dormant Accounts: available to all Memberships both Corporate and Regular. Certificates in a dormant status do not receive Club mailings and cannot be used at any time unless re-activated and authorized by the Board. At the time of re-activation a fee may be applicable and an active plan would have to be chosen. Members who are granted a dormant account are not required to pay assessments.
- Note: Dormant accounts will have last rights and privileges should a Waiting List for playing privileges in sporting activities be implemented.*
- Plan #9 STUDENT: up to the age of 24 in full time attendance at a recognized School or University. A certificate holder in this category would not be called on to participate in the assessment plan.

- Plan #10 SENIOR CITIZEN: 65 years or better. No assessment.
- Plan #11 For those members who prefer to pay cash or use credit cards in the Food and Beverage Areas rather than charging items to their account. Members who choose this plan are required to spend a minimum of \$240.00 per year in the Food and Beverage Area and are required to provide the Club with proof of purchase acceptable to the Club prior to fiscal year end.

Club members are reminded that whatever plan they choose, the Charge becomes a regular part of your account and is governed by our By-Laws: Non-payment could result in suspension of all privileges.

If you have any questions or require any explanations on any of the assessment plans please contact the Club Manager at 563-0357.

Section 8. (a) of the Constitution and By-Laws which govern the operation of Regular Members' Accounts states:

8. (1) The secretary shall cause members' bills or accounts to be mailed to them by the 8th day of the month following the month in which they were incurred and if a member fails to pay any indebtedness to the Society within thirty (30) days after the bill for the same has been mailed to the member the member (and if the member is a corporate member, then the corporate member and its designate) shall by reason of such default be suspended from all membership privileges until the member's indebtedness and any reinstatement fee has been paid in full. Upon such default the directors may cause the member's name and amount of indebtedness to be posted on the bulletin board in the clubhouse and a notice of default in writing shall be sent to the member and if the member is a corporate member, its designate. If such indebtedness and reinstatement fee, if any, is not paid within fifteen (15) days of the mailing of such notice, the delinquent member shall forfeit all rights and privileges of membership and cease to be a member of the Society, but such members may, upon satisfactory explanation, be reinstated as a member by a majority vote of the directors upon payment of all indebtedness to the Society at date of suspension, and any reinstatement and/or penalty fees set from time to time by the directors.
