## From the Superintendent

Just to bring everyone up to date on the 14th green project, I thought I would inform you of our progress to date.

Both ponds have been cribbed with logs and the water level will be raised to the bottom of the lower log. We have back-filled around both rows of logs to help eliminate some of the slope leading down to the water's edge. It will also help in defining the pond and add aesthetics to the course as well.

The green itself was built to U.S.G.A. specifications with a 4% grade from back to front, and measures 7000 square feet. The green is complete except for some finish raking. Weather did not co-operate with us to allow enough time to lay sod, so it will be sodded early next spring with an estimated opening date of June first.

The green will have three traps surrounding it; one at lower right and two on the left side. The tee will start 30 feet in front of the pond and extend 140 feet back to the right side along the fence. The tee itself will be approximately 500 square feet and will be sodded in the spring. Construction on the tee has been hampered by snow but as much work as possible will be completed this fall.

I hope you've all had an enjoyable golf season and we will see you next spring.

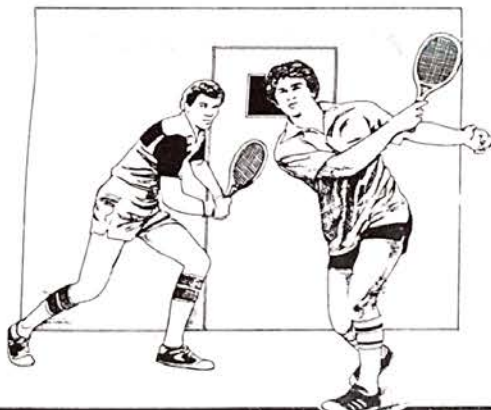

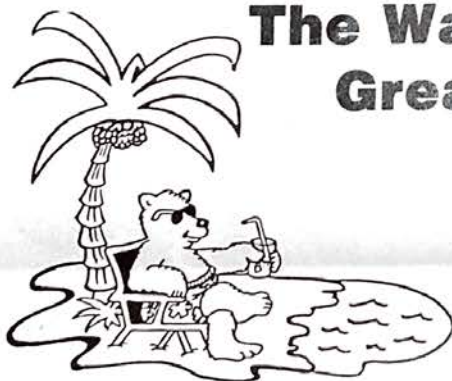

## Curling Playoff Formats

### MEN

1. **OPEN ZONE:** There are seven zones in the B.C. Interior Curling Association. We are Zone 5. Teams from the following clubs, if they affiliate with the BCICA, may enter: 100 Mile, Williams Lake, Quesnel, Prince George, Salmon Valley, Mackenzie, Valemount, McBride, Fraser Lake, Fort St. James, and Vanderhoof. Each club is allowed to send as many teams as wish to participate. Players on the teams do not have to be from the same club but must be from the same zone. The above teams play a modified-double-knockout draw to qualify one team as Zone 5 winner. Each zone has a playoff for one winner. These 7 zone winners get a berth in Tankard.
2. **REGIONAL SPIEL:** The B.C. Interior is now divided into three regions. (1) Zones 1 & 2, (2) Zones 3, 4 & 7, (3) Zone 5 (us) & 6 (Burns Lake West). Each region will hold their own regional spiel. As many teams may enter as wish to play in a triple knock-out draw. Each region will qualify three teams, 1-A, 1-B, 1-C. There is no advantage for Zone winners to enter this part of the playoff.
3. **TANKARD:** 16 team playoff (3 from each region = 9) plus 7 zone winners play a triple knock-out draw to qualify 1-A, 1-B, 2-C to play in Provincials.
4. **PROVINCIALS:** 8 team round robin (4 above teams plus 4 from the Pacific Coast Curling Association). Three top teams play for 1 winner (winner of 2nd and 3rd plays 1st team to represent B.C. in Canadian Labatt's Brier).
5. **CANADIAN:** 12 team round robin (one team from each Province and Territory, except Ontario—they have a north and south team). Four top teams from the round robin playoff to one winner for World.
6. **WORLD:** Same playoff format as for Canadian except for number of teams.

### SENIOR MEN (must be 50+ on July 1st, etc.)

1. **OPEN ZONE:** Zones and teams same as for Men. The seniors play a modified-double-knockout to qualify one winner.
2. **BCICA:** 7 or 8 teams triple-knockout (one team from each zone plus a team from the host club if the zone rep is not from the host club). One team to qualify.
3. **PROVINCIAL:** Two team playoff—best of 3 games (the above winner plus one team from the Coast).
4. **CANADIAN:** Round robin play to one winner (12 teams like the men). No world as yet.

### MASTERS (Men must be 60+ as of July 1st, etc.)

All levels played the same format as Senior Men above except BCICA is a modified-double-knockout instead of triple. No Canadian, only four western provinces.

### JUNIOR MEN (must be under 19 as of July 1st, etc.)

1. **OPEN ZONE:** Same as Men
2. **BCICA:** Eight team round robin qualifying two teams.
3. **PROVINCIAL:** Four teams (the above two plus two from the Pacific Coast Curling Assn.) play a round robin for one winner.
4. **CANADIAN & WORLD:** Same as Men.

### MIXED (Must be 2 men and 2 women, alternate positions)

1. **OPEN ZONE:** Same format as Men — play to one winner.

2. **INTERZONE:** Zone 5 winner plus Zone 6 winner play best of 3 games (Zone 6 includes all clubs west of Burns Lake).
3. **PROVINCIAL:** 8 team double-knockout to one winner (four teams from the Interior, one from Zones 1 & 2, two from Zones 3, 4 & 7, one from Zones 5 & 6) and four teams from the Coast.
4. **CANADIAN:** 12 team round robin, same as Men. No world playoffs.

### LADIES

1. **OPEN ZONE:** The B.C. Ladies Curling Association is divided into ten districts. We are District 10, which is divided into two zones because of the distances. We are the north half or Cariboo Zone, which includes Prince George, Quesnel, Williams Lake, McBride, and Forest Grove. The south half, or Thompson Zone, includes Barriere, Clearwater, Clinton, Lillooet, Logan Lake, Kamloops, North Kamloops, Valemount and Wells Gray.

Playoff format is as follows: Zone playoffs are open to as many teams as wish to enter. The four players on a team do not have to belong to the same club but must be from the same Zone. These teams play a semi-modified-double-knockout draw qualifying four teams (two from A and two from B).

2. **DISTRICTS:** Eight teams (above 4 teams from the Cariboo Zone and 4 teams from the Thompson Zone) play a semi-modified-double-knockout draw to get one winner to represent District 10 at Provincials.
3. **PROVINCIALS:** 10 team round robin (one from each district) play for one winner, to be the Provincial Champion.
4. **CANADIAN:** 12 team round robin (one from each Province, one from the Territories, plus last year's Canadian Champion). four top teams from the round robin play single-knockout to declare the Canadian Champion.
5. **WORLD:** Round robin draw - top four teams of the round robin playoff to declare a World Champion.

### SENIOR LADIES (must be 50 years+ - same as Men)

1. **OPEN ZONE:** Zone boundaries are the same as Ladies. Team entries are the same as for Ladies except for the playoff format which is determined by the number of teams entered. Three teams or less play a double round robin, 4 or 5 teams play a single round robin, 6 or more play a semi-modified-double knockout to qualify two teams.
2. **DISTRICTS:** Four teams (above two teams from Cariboo Zone and two teams from Thompson Zone) play a single round robin to get one winner to represent District 10 at Provincials.
3. **PROVINCIALS:** Same as Ladies.
4. **CANADIAN:** 12 team round robin (one from each Province except Ontario, which has 1 team from south and 1 from north) plus one team from the Territories. Top four teams from the round robin play a single knockout to declare Canadian Champion. No world playoffs.

### JUNIOR WOMEN (Must be 19+ - same as junior men)

1. **OPEN ZONE:** Same as Senior Ladies.
2. **DISTRICTS:** Same as Senior Ladies.
3. **PROVINCIALS:** Same as Senior Ladies.
4. **CANADIAN:** Same as Senior Ladies.
5. **WORLD:** Same as Ladies.

## HOUSE RULES for all "House" Leagues

Revised 1988

- PAID spare curlers may play any position, providing they are replacing the missing curler from that rink, or a lower position.
- A curler who curls in any one of the house leagues in our Club can spare at any time (social spare), but **MUST** play LEAD.
- (a) Ladies may not spare in Men's leagues.  
(b) Men may not spare in Ladies' leagues.
- No person is allowed on the ice with street shoes or boots.
- In Club curling, when curling with three players, Lead and Second must throw **THREE** rocks each.
- In Mixed curling, Ladies and Men **MUST** play alternate positions. Man or Lady may skip (in the event that you play with three players only, you can curl your regular positions).
- (a) Men's and Ladies' Leagues - All games will be eight (8) ends.  
(b) Mixed Leagues - All games will be eight (8) ends in length.
- Ensure that the ice is cleaned after **EVERY** draw. **WINNERS** are responsible for cleaning the ice.

Any violation of these rules could result in a game forfeit. If you are aware of a violation prior to commencement of play, same should be resolved at that time. However, a written protest can be made within one week of the alleged violation (i.e., protest must be made prior to the same draw in the following week) to the Curling Committee.

Note: C.C.A. or C.L.C.A. Rules apply to all BONSPIELS and PLAYDOWNS.

### PLEASE KEEP THE ICE SURFACE CLEAN

- No street shoes allowed on ice surface.
- WINNERS** will clean ice.
- Ensure ice is cleaned after **EVERY** draw.
- Pull rocks out from the boards, remove foam bumpers, sweeping out ends and corners. Rocks are **NOT** to be removed from ice surface.
- Clean areas along sides of sheets prior to using mop.
- Mop to be used over entire ice surface.
- Take down score - ready for next draw.

A little time, effort and co-operation will help keep our ice clean.
