From the President

The Prince George Golf & Curling Club is one of the most diversified facilities in British Columbia, and as members, we should be truly proud of what the club has to offer.

It has always been the mandate of the Board of Directors to offer our services at reasonable rates to our members while still allowing the club to maintain and improve its facilities.

The following is an article written by Stephen Johnston, Partner, Peat Marwick Thorne, Markham, Richmond Hill.

WHY IS GOLF SO EXPENSIVE?

I remember my father explaining to me why golf was a rich man's game when he was a boy. Now we are in the 1990s and I find myself making similar comments to my children.

The major reason for the high expense of golf is the cost of developing golf courses. Newer courses tend to be constructed as championship courses with large clubhouses. As a result, the typical cost is in the \$6 million to \$8 million range, excluding the cost of land, which can be very expensive in the vicinity of a major city. Assuming a maximum of 30,000 rounds per year per 18 holes, a player needs to pay approximately \$30 just to pay for the interest on debt for construction, let alone for the cost of maintenance and profit. This, plus the high cost of championship course maintenance, has made even public golf courses expensive to play, with green fees of \$50 to \$75 not uncommon.

Because of increased green fees, many golfers have considered joining private clubs. However, even in this recessionary market, most Toronto-area clubs have an initiation fee of \$20,000 to \$30,000 plus an annual due of \$2,500 to \$3,000. Based on a 10% interst rate on capital paid for the initiation fee and, say, 40 rounds per year, the cost would be approximately \$125 per round. Again, a very expensive sport.

In order to justify the expense, the baby boomers are seeking out clubs with a family environment. They want to be able to play with their spouses at prime time.

This situation has raised a few eyebrows at established clubs and high-end public courses where early morning weekend tee times have traditionally been reserved for men.

Since new clubs can accommodate change more easily, they should have an edge in selling memberships. But potential members tend to be wary of committing their funds to a club that donesn't already have a strong memberhip base.

What does the future hold? Well, golfers wil gradually learn to pay more for golf. But they will aso expect some compromise, and traditions will change. More private clubs will accept some form of public golf in order to reduce annual dues, and hopefully, future clubhouses will be smaller and able to accommmodate a mixed crowd.

In the end, possibly, inflation will make golf a more affordable game for our grandchildren.

From the Green Committee

The Green Committee constantly reviews problems associated with the playability of our golf course and we strive to find the best solution to these problems. An on-going problem seems to be the formation of a lip or ridge which appears around the cup as the golf day progresses.

One of the first things we reviewed, in trying to determine the cause of this problem, was the method used by our grounds crew to set the cup and pin. We found that the grounds crew uses a cup setter that has a large flat flange and once the cup is set this tool leaves the area around the cup perfectly flat. Therefore, we are satisfied that our grounds crew is properly setting the pins and cups each morning.

We have also observed our golfing membership throughout the year and we have identified what we think are the three possible causes of this problem.

First, golfers unknowingly damage the hole by using the head of their putter to extract the ball. Second, we have observed golfers and caddies, while tending the pin, unknowingly applying an uplifting pressure on the ground around the cup. Without first pulling the pin out of the receptacle at the bottom of the cup, golfers and caddies grasp the pin near the top and pull back. The leverage generated by the pin when tended in this manner results in a lifting of the turf on one side of the cup and a compression of the turf on the opposite side of the cup. Third, as the day progresses the area around the cup slowly becomes depressed or compressed by the weight of the golfers' feet as they finish their putts and then bend over the hole to extract their ball.

While members can't eliminate the third problem we can refrain from extracting the ball from the hole with our putter and refrain from tending the pin in the manner described above.

The club has approved the concept of a Memorial Weekend. A plaque will be developed, showing a picture and brief description of the membes so honoured. The plaque will then be permanently displayed within the club.

The criteria for future members will be based on long term volunteer contributions of time and effort. These being serving on the Board of Directors, serving on one of the other committees within the club, or other long term contribuitons to the club.

A form will be made available at the main office. The form will include the name of the proposed member, a description of the members' contributions to the club and signature of 25 members in good standing who are supporting the nomination.

The completed form will then be forwarded to the Golf Committee for review. If appropriate, the Golf Committee would then make a recommendation to the Board of Directors for final approval.



Golf Course Rules & Regulations

The golf Committee would like to inform members that it is our responsibility to police ourselves about course etiquette and slow play. Should you see what you feel is an infraction of the rules, please fill out a complaint form available at the front desk of the club.



The club now has a mechanism in place to deal with concerns out on the golf course. We trust that where warranted members will use the mechanism to make our club a better place to enjoy the game of golf.

Saturday and Sunday mornings have presented another problem. A number of members are not booking a tee time and are playing the course before the 6:00 am opening. The 6:00 am opening was set to allow our grounds crew time to prepare the course without interfering with the play of golfers who hold Annual Golf Dues.

The grounds crew requires a lead time of approximately 30 to 45 minutes in order to stay ahead of the golfers. While it is unfortunate that we cannot accommodate members who wish to play in this fashion, the Green Committee and Golf Committee are asking all golfers to not tee off prior to 6:00 am.

Members are most welcome to bring a guest to play during restricted periods, providing the guest meets the following criteria:

- The guest must reside outside of a 50 mile radius of Prince George;
- 2. There is a limit of one guest per member.

Restricted periods are defined as mornings on Saturdays, Sundays and statutory holidays, in addition to Men's Night and Ladies' Day. Guests from within Prince George are most welcome for play during non-restricted periods.

The situtation will be monitored and we thank all members in advance for complying with these old policies which you may or may not have known about.

Weekend & Holiday Equal Booking for Dues Paying Members

- The Booking Slip is completed by a designated Member of the Group, and then dropped in a box prior to the Thursday preceding the weekend. The draw will be made on Thursday morning.
- A minimum of three names are required on the booking slip.
- Men's night ballots must be in by Sunday night and the draw wil be made on Monday morning.
- Groups do not always request the same times each Saturday and Sunday morning. This may result in a spread of tee times from 7:00 am until approximately 10:00 am.
- Ticking off a preference for an earlier or later booking on the booking slips will assist the Pro Shop in allocating times when your elected time is already drawn and given to another group.

Non-Prime Time Privileges Monday through Friday

Members holding Non-Prime Time privileges cannot golf at all on Saturdays, Sundays or statutory holidays. If a person wishes to golf in the afternoon on these days, they would be required to pay Society Member Green Fees.

Members holding Non-Prime Time privileges cannot participate in either Ladies' Day or Men's Night or weekend club events (i.e., mixed, club championship, etc., which occur during Prime Time restricted periods). This classification is a Monday through Friday privilege only.

Golf Course Etiquette & Regulations

- All members and Green Fee players must be dressed in a manner that will uphold the dignity of the club at all times, as outlined by the criteria of the Dress Code.
- Only golf shoes or running shoes are allowed on the course; no boots or high heeled shoes are permitted.
- Children under the age of 16 are not permitted on the course unless they are:
 - a registered Junior member of the club
 - accompanied by an adult 19 years of age or older
 - accompanied by a participant in a club sanctioned event

Children under the age of 6 are not allowed on the course at any time, nor are non-participating juniors under 16 years of age. The only exception to the above rules are authorized caddies.

- 4. Green fee tickets must be carried on the course at all times.
- Each person in a foursome must have a set of clubs and a bag.

- 6. All carts must be kept off greens and out of the sand traps.
- 7. Power carts are not permitted among the trees.
- Only 2 persons and 2 golf bags are permitted on a cart at one time.
- No player should play until all participants in front are out of range.
- Participants must replace divots, repair ball marks and rake sandtraps after use.
- Please replace rakes inside the sandtraps, parallel to the fairway.
- 12. Slow play is not permitted. Members are accustomed to a 4 hour round. If you cannot keep up this pace, wave the following group(s) through.
- Players stopping off in the clubhouse after the 9th hole have NO priority at the 10th tee.
- No alcoholic beverages are allowed on the course except in allocated areas, i.e., concession stand.
- Language and conduct should be kept under control at all times.
- Rules of play shall be governed by the rules and regulations as set out by the R.C.G.A. and the club's local rules.

It is the duty of every member and their guests to familiarize themselves with the club rules and regulations, as ignorance thereof shall not excuse anyone for any breach or neglect of the same.


G.E.A.C. Canada Limited, as a full service company, supplies Club Management Systems, computer hardware, on-going support services as well as implementation assistance and customer modifications.



DID YOU KNOW??

If you wish to change your account status to "Dormant", your account must be paid in full and the Club must receive a written request to place your account in dormancy.

If you request your account be placed in dormancy, and later you wish to reactivate it, you must pay a reactivation fee, currently \$300.00 plus GST.

For those of you who pay lump sum amounts to avoid sending a monthly cheque for your assessment ... check out options Y or Z below. These options are applicable to both regular and corporate memberships.

Account payment posting is much easier if you send in the remittance portion of your statement. This identifies your account number for us and eliminates any follow up required to determine the account number.

If you have any questions about dormancy or the assessment options, please contact Shirley or Brenda.

Assessment Options

As a Club Member, you have the following options:

- Plan A \$7.50 per month Club Assessment, plus GST, billed monthly; applicable to active members 65 years of age or better and Club members who reside outside of a 50 mile radius of Prince George.
- Plan B \$15.00 per month Club Assessment, plus GST, billed monthly; applicable to all active Club Members except those described by Plan A.
- Plan C \$0.00 Dormant Accounts; available to all memberships, both Corporate and Individual. Certificates in a dormant status do not receive Club mailings, do not have membership privileges and cannot charge. Membership and charging privileges may be reinstated by paying a fee and obtaining Board authorization. The account must be returned to Plan A, B, Y or Z as all active accounts are required to pay an assessment.
- Plan Y Same as Plan A, except the assessment is billed annually, in May.
- Plan Z Same as Plan B, except the assessment is billed annually, in May.
