From the Icemaker

Curling ice and rocks, along with you and I, make up the game of curling and depending on the quality of all of the above, the game can be played with more or less enjoyment.

As far as the human aspect goes, we can practice, attend clinics or rent instruction videos to improve our game. The quality of the ice, however, is up to the icemaker and the equipment and the weather conditions he has to work with.

The 40-pound curling rocks can make or break the game, so they should be treated with respect by the staff of every club and cared for properly during the curling season and in the off-season.

In the spring the stones are stored in a dry room, on carpet, and the handles are all loosened. In the fall the handles are turned 180 degrees and the rocks **should** be rotated from the outside sheets to the inside sheets.


In this era of the push broom the ice is much cleaner without the pulp from the corn brooms. We are now faced with keen and sometimes very straight ice, which can make it difficult, if not impossible, for an icemaker to produce ice that some rocks will curl on.
