







For equitable stroke control, #16 is a Par 4.



From the Superintendent

With the warmer spring weather, the grass is greening up nicely now. With the healthier grass come some maintenance practices which create undesirable playing conditions.



Top-dressing is a necessity with aeration to fill the aeration holes and adding desirable material to the root zone. This creates avenues for water and nutrient movement thus creating a better soil profile and healthier root system.

The water injection aeration system (hydroject) is great for temporary relief of compaction. However, it does not change the soil profile or reduce thatch, meaning core aeration is a necessity on poorly constructed greens, or greens with excessive thatch.

The thatch layer at our course is minimal and with the past top-dressing programs, the soil structure of the older greens has been greatly improved. Thus I will not be core aerating the greens this spring. I will increase the amount of hydrojecting, verticutting (mechanical thatch removal) and very light top-dressing.

I will maintain a watch on the greens throughout the summer to see if a fall aeration will be necessary this year.

During aeration processes, the flag will be moved to a temporary green to allow for the job to be completed more quickly. Your patience is appreciated.

Greens Design

With the construction of #4 and #16 complete, with sod and seed in place, the design committee thought the membership would like to know a little about how the committee comes up with the design for each new hole.

The design committee consists of Tom Cole, Laurie Pierce, Stan Wettlauffer, Hugh Patterson, and Murray Kutyn. As a committee, we are charged with developing the design for each new green on the golf course.

There are many factors which influence our design. The golfer should be provided with a challenge, playability, aesthetics and a healthy putting surface. The first step to achieve all this comes from your greens committee. They decide which green or greens is next to be rebuilt the following year. Our first step is to survey the total area to be developed. This includes actual physical measurements, shape and slope. We also take photos of the green area and from the fairway where the approach shot will be hit, for reference. We then meet, usually in December, to the development of our design.



To create a green which satisfies the needs of the game of golf, we must be concerned with size, shape, slope, contours, maintenance, and aesthetics. These aspects of green design are influenced by the distance of the approach shot, the slope in the landing area of the fairway, and the angle from which the approach shot is hit. We also give consideration to the surrounding area as well in an effort to integrate the design into the overall landscape to maintain balance and flow over the entire area. We also discuss bunker placement traffic, maintenance problems and location of cart paths. Usually after several meetings, we have come up with a design we hope will meet all design criteria. This is then taken to the greens committee for approval. Once we have that, we meet again to build the model you see at the wine and cheese party each spring.

We are enthused over the job at hand and want the golf course to be the best it can be, for all members of all handicaps. Enjoy your golf season.






